#### Why are we learning this?

The intention of this topic is to help you build an understanding of the dynamic and diverse History of Britain. It aims to develop an understanding of British History and culture as well as engaging with a range of Historical skills

# WHAT IS HISTORY?



The word 'History' comes from the Ancient Greek word 'Historia' which means to investigate.

History is essentially the study of people – how they lived, what they have done, what they valued and how their lives were influenced by the time and place in which they were born.

The study of history helps us to better understand why our modern world is the way that it is, as we can investigate the causes and consequences of specific historical events.

Historians need to work as detectives – piecing together the clues to be able to come to some conclusions about what life was like in the past.

# ACTIVITY 1: MAKE YOUR OWN HISTORY

Another key skill that we use in History is chronology. Chronology is a word meaning 'the study of time'. This skill means putting events in chronological order therefore listing them in the order in which they happened. A simple way to understand chronology is by creating a timeline. Your task is to create your own timeline. Plot on your timeline important events in your life, things you have done or things that have happened to you. Remember to include pictures!

By creating your own timeline you are looking at your very own History!

Example: 23<sup>rd</sup> March 2020. Everyone went into lockdown. Who are you in lockdown with? How do you feel? What have you done during lockdown?

Start: When you were born

End: Present day, June 2020

# ACTIVITY 2: CREATE YOUR OWN FAMILY TREE

A family tree is a chart that shows all the people in a family over many generations and their relationship to one another. It is called a family tree because it is ever changing, adding and taking away leaves and branches, much like our own families.

How to create your own:

- ✓ Start with yourself and work backwards.
- ✓ A horizontal line is to represent a marriage or partnership
- ✓ A vertical line is to represent children
- ✓ See the example on the next page


Family tree's are an important part of History. By creating your own you will look at your own family History!



# ACTIVITY 3: LOOKING AT CURRENT AFFAIRS

In the last few weeks Black Lives Matter protesters have marched against racial inequality. Last week footballers and referees at the restarted premier league matches 'took the knee' to show their support for racial equality.

It is important to make sure that when you study History you acknowledge and embrace diversity. It helps dismiss negative stereotypes and personal biases about different groups. In addition, cultural diversity helps us recognise and respect "ways of being" that are not necessarily our own. It is imperative to learn about Historical events, good and bad in order to ensure that history doesn't repeat itself and we learn to be more open minded and accept all people despite their race, gender or sexuality.

# WINDRUSH DAY 22ND JUNE 2020

Windrush Day will take place on 22<sup>nd</sup> June, This marks the day when around 500 migrants from the Caribbean arrived at Tilbury Docks in Essex in 1948.

Many people from the Caribbean thought that they would receive a good welcome when they arrived in Britain, but this was not the case. As more people arrived from the Caribbean, many faced prejudice and discrimination. Protests such as The Bristol Bus Boycott of 1963 eventually led to changes in the law.

Race Relations Acts in the 1960s and 1970s made it illegal to discriminate against someone because of their race. But laws do not always change peoples attitudes or behaviour. Unfortunately, racism and discrimination still exists in the UK.


