What is Religious Studies?

Religious Studies is about MUCH MORE than just learning about different religions.

As well as learning about different religious beliefs & practises we will also look at non-religious ideas & beliefs.



But our lessons are not just about understanding what other people believe and do, you will consider your own opinion about big questions, such as 'Are ghosts real?' or 'Who/what created the universe?' In doing so you will develop the ability to share and justify your own opinion whilst being able to listen to and engage with the opinions of others.

Task 1 – Places of Worship

Visit the website *Truetube* and take a tour of the holy buildings that are used within the world religions.

Once you've watched a video here's an example of some things you could do:

- Try making a leaflet to hand out to someone who would be visiting the place of worship: Let them know what they need to think about before visiting (e.g. special clothing), give them key information to help them discover the key parts of the building whilst walking around.
- Get creative and make a model version of a chosen place of worship (could you use Lego, Minecraft, shoebox?)
- Draw and label the key features or objects you would find inside a place of worship. Try to explain what they are used for during worship.



Pick a topic that is linked to Religious Studies, for example:


- A celebrity atheist (someone who is known for speaking out about not believing in a God)

Task 6 – Write a Speech

Once you have written your speech you could then rehearse it before performing it to someone at home – see if you are able to convince them to agree with your viewpoint.






- Learn about the topic (make sure you've done your research)

 - Address why someone may disagree with you BUT then explain how you can overcome their objections.
