Science



Some of our Year 13 Physics students took part in the Y13 Challenge paper from the British Physics Olympiad.

The paper was based on the common curriculum for Year 13 students.

It involved problem-solving and contained questions that relate to A Level (or equivalent) topics to stretch thinking into the applications and ideas rather than to keep to the content of the syllabus, preparing students for further work, or for interview practice.

All students achieved a certificate for their efforts and Jack Crosthwaite did well enough to achieve a Merit.

Well done to all!

Four of our Chemistry students were invited to take part in this year's Royal Society of Chemistry Top of the Bench Challenge.

Sixteen schools in South Yorkshire took part and the results were incredibly close. Only three marks separated the top 10.

Well done to Hill House School and Notre Dame who tied for first place.

The students were awarded £20 for taking part - they decided to use this to purchase twenty selection boxes which they are donating to a local charity.

The students involved were Amogh and Renee from Y9, Daisy from Y10 and Samuel from Y11.



Film Studies





Y9 Film Studies students enjoyed an early morning screening at Cineworld of the latest instalment in the James Bond film series – No Time to Die.

Students then used their knowledge of the movie as they explored the British film industry in lessons. They have learned about different career pathways and discovered the skills needed by individuals who work in different film production departments.



Prior to this, Y9s learned about the key elements of film form including cinematography, sound, mise en scene and editing through a study of superhero films.

To demonstrate their understanding of these elements, the students recently planned, shot and edited their own superhero trailer using iMovie.

Film Studies



Y10 Film studies students have made a terrific start to the GCSE course.

Beginning with Richard Ayoade's Submarine, students explored aesthetics in British Independent cinema through this coming of age romcom. Pupils have also explored Tomas Alfredson's Swedish horror film, Let the Right One In, as part of their study of a Global, non-English language film. After Christmas, students will begin creating their own horror film!

FILM CLUB

Review 500 gives film club members the chance to get creative and adds a new dimension to their film watching. Once they've watched a film, we encourage our club members to log in and post a review on the relevant film page on the Into Film website. To be eligible for Review 500, reviews should be no longer than 500 words, and all eligible submissions are judged by the Into Film Team.

Performing Arts

They are studying the groundbreaking musical as part of their coursework where they are approaching it through practical work as well as looking at the production team and how the musical was created.



Social Science

Our Y12 Child Development students are now accessing the work placement element of the course. They are able to apply their theoretical knowledge as to how children learn to the early years provisions that they are gaining practical experience in.

Humanities A LEVEL PHILOSOPHY


Students in Year 12 Moral Philosophy have been learning about two different ethical theories: Utilitarianism and Kantian Ethics.




HISTORY

22/09 Derby County FC Away

It was led by Steve Greatorex who coaches for Wakefield Whirlwinds. We also had Wickersley's own Hayley Cassin (Y9) as the assistant coach for the day as she plays for the club. Pupils were taught the basics of working the specialised wheelchair, as well as the adapted skills and rules which allowed pupils to play a competitive tournament against one another. The pupils represented the school tremendously well and really enjoyed the session, so much so that we are running a second day in December to build on the pupils' current skills and experience.

DANCE TRIP

At the end of November, 30 Dance students travelled to London for two days to experience the magic of the West End.



Students got to watch 'Mary Poppins' and '& Juliet' and see how the lighting, set and costumes all came together in productions of that size. They also got the opportunity to go to the famous Pineapple Dance Studios and take part in dance workshops with cast members from both of these shows where they learnt repertoire from the 'Supercalifrag ilisticexpialidocious' and 'Roar' numbers. In addition to all of this, students were able to experience some of the sights and sounds that London had to offer including the London Eye and Covent Garden. 





ICT AND COMPUTING

In Year 8, students are working on the fundamental skills required to create computer programs.

Using a tool called Flowol, students worked on logical reasoning and problem solving skills to design programs for real world control systems such as traffic lights. Students created flowcharts, applying key programming constructs such as sequence, selection, iteration and subroutines.

ICT AND COMPUTING


Students in Year 8 are currently applying their logic and problem solving skills to create programs for the BBC Micro:bit.





Using a block based coding interface, students are writing programs, taking input from the devices buttons and sensors, performing processing and delivering an output via the 25 LEDs.

Example work from Cameron Bryan - a rock, paper, scissors game on the Micro:bit.


