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Curriculum Intent

The MFL curriculum is designed to empower students to draw maximum cultural, personal and economic benefit from the role of global citizenship. Through the promotion of oracy, expansion of vocabulary and literacy we seek to enable students to communicate confidently and without barriers in a wide range of social settings and media. In KS5 we believe that our curriculum and enrichment content promotes a seamless transition into the A-Level language course from KS4.

In order to do this the MFL curriculum is sequenced to allow knowledge and skills to develop simultaneously and progressively. By revisiting and enhancing key language skills in different settings students develop their ability to recall, analyse and evaluate usage and at the same time build independence and resilience. We have a duty to ensure our students understand and engage with other cultures and traditions in a respectful and inquisitive manner which will allow them to become more open-minded, empathetic and adaptable to new experiences in the future at home or abroad. Ultimately, we aim to foster in our students a love of languages by nurturing a linguistic curiosity, their self-efficacy and an intrinsic motivation to explore and respect other languages, cultures and people.

Year 12 Curriculum

The A-level language course offers students a truly exciting and in-depth study of their chosen language. Students have the opportunity to enhance and refine their language skills building on prior knowledge and learning a breadth of new vocabulary through engaging topics. The topics studied at A-Level enable students to develop confidence and consistently improve their fluency and understanding of complex grammar.

Furthermore, all topics are infused with real life examples of current issues affecting French and Spanish speaking countries, as well as important themes linked to cultural heritage. This enables students to become immersed in the culture from the very start of the course. The literary texts and films also give students essential skills such as learning to analyse and evaluate sources in a foreign language whilst simultaneously enhancing their essay writing skills.

At A-Level students are continuously assessed throughout the course in lessons on a range of skills; listening, reading, translation, writing, speaking and grammar. Students also sit mock examinations in listening, reading, speaking and writing throughout the year.

Broadening Horizons

In MFL we aim to foster a learning environment supporting students to become global citizens. Our use of cultural resources interleaved throughout the curriculum, help to bring the language to life in the classroom, creating cultural experiences for all.

Outside of language lessons there are opportunities for students to develop an awareness and love of different cultures. Throughout the A-level curriculum students constantly research and form opinions on cultural topics.

As part of the speaking assessment students prepare an Independent Research Project (IRP), enabling them to have dedicated study time for intense research on a topic of their choice from the French/Spanish speaking world.

Furthermore, students have the opportunity to attend a workshop at Sheffield University to get expert advice on writing an essay and film analysis which is an essential part of their A-Level course.

El Laberinto del Fauno - A Spanish Film Study

In 1944, in the post-Civil War in Spain, rebels still fight in the mountains against the Falangist troops. The young and imaginative Ofelia travels with her pregnant and sick mother Carmen Vidal to the country to meet and live with her stepfather, the sadistic and cruel Captain Vidal, in an old mill. During the night, Ofelia meets a fairy and together they go to a pit in the centre of a maze where they meet a faun that tells that she is a princess from a kingdom in the underground. He also tells that her father is waiting for her, but she needs to accomplish three gruesome, tough and dangerous assignments first. Meanwhile, she becomes a friend of the servant Mercedes, who is the sister of one of the rebels and actually is giving support to the group. In a dark, harsh and violent world, Ofelia lives her magical world trying to survive her tasks and sees her father and king again.



Careers

We run a series of 'Careers in the Curriculum' weeks in our school. For Modern Foreign Languages, this week takes place in February.

During MFL lessons, we investigate languages around the world and the importance of language learning in the global jobs market.
