

What is blank page dumping?


- 1) Before you look at your revision flashcards, your revision guides, your book. You write the topic name in the middle of a piece of paper and you get everything that you can remember down. You must try hard here, recall is key. All the studies suggest that trying your hardest to think back and remember is what builds strong neurological pathways
- 2) When you are "maxed out" you look at your notes, give them a read, take in as much as you can remember.
- 3) Turn over your notes (DON'T JUST COPY FROM THEM) and do your second knowledge dumb, try to get the detail you can. Once you've maxed out, repeat.



Mind Maps

What is Mind Mapping?

- 1) In short these are spider diagrams in fancy pants and hat.
- 2) Using your revision notes/work/ revision guide you take a copy and try to manipulate it across the page.
- 3) What are the links, what are the key themes, how does it develop. Being geography don't forget. Describe, Explain and Evaluate
- 4) Making them bright, colourful, take your time. Being visual is the key here.







What is Dual Coding?


Dual coding is where we use a combination of pictures and writing to help us to recall and present the information we are trying to learn.

This technique combines mind maps and page dumbing together into one technique.

Dual Coding










Dual Coding



- 1) Decide how you are going to present your work, make sure it is a combination of pictures and writing. It must be both. We are trying to make is visual.
- 2) From memory (like blank page dumbing) try to get down what you can remember. Make sure you are taking care of the presentation, draw pictures be creative.
- 3) Take time to look at and review what you have done, give it time to settle into your memory
 - 4) When you don't think you can remember any more, take a look at your notes. Give yourself some time to read and understand the ideas
- 5) Go back to your Dual Coding sheet, but your notes away (do not look at them) then add to your dual coding sheet. Build up the pictures, build up the writing.
 - 6) Repeat until you are happy
 - 7) Don't forget, Describe, Explain, Evaluate. These are key to geography success.

Opportunities for development in Alaska

Mineral Extraction

Alaska has abundant mineral resources, including coal, copper, silver, gold and zinc. During the 1800s, there was a gold rush to the state. Twenty per cent of Alaska's mineral wealth lies in gold. Alaska's second most valuable non-energy commodity is gravel, with more than a billion tons mined, worth \$2.1 billion at today's prices.

Energy

There are vast reserves of oil and gas in the north of Alaska. One-third of the state's income comes from the industry, which employs over 100,000 people. Oil is transported from Prudhoe Bay in the north to Valdez in the south by the trans-Alaskan pipeline. The oil is heated as it travels along the pipe to stop it from freezing. In addition, the pipeline is raised above the land to avoid melting the permafrost, which could cause the pipeline to break.

Fishing

The fishing industry employs eighty thousand people in Alaska. Alaska's 3,000 rivers, three million lakes and 10,686 kilometres of coastline are rich in fish, including salmon, trout and several species of white fish. The industry is worth \$8 billion to the economy. In addition, indigenous people use fish to provide food, clothing, and oil as part of their subsistence lifestyle.

Tourism

Alaska's spectacular environments with mountains and glaciers attract over 2 million tourists every year. In addition, cruises are popular, with 60% of summer tourists arriving this way.

The importance of re-assessing
